2025 ANNUAL REPORT TO DONORS

ANNUAL GOLF TOURNAMENT

This year we hosted our 17th Annual Wellesley High Alumni & Friends Golf Championship outing and fundraiser on July 18th at Sandy Burr Country Club in Wayland. We entered the tournament planning again with both heartache and heartfelt appreciation for the continued support of many friends. We had 116 golfers, 28 tee-box sign sponsors, and a number of raffle item donations. As a gift to our players, we included a sleeve of Titleist Path Foundation golf balls. We awarded prizes for low team scores; first, second & third place, plus low mixed-foursome, high team score and the new “legends” category for a team of 70+ year-old players, and five hole specific prizes. We had 17 teams shoot under par. There was a tie for low score, and Team Gendron won the tiebreaker. The 2026 tournament promises to be a lot of fun for every team. It will be held on Friday July 17, 2026, at Sandy Burr Country Club. We appreciate the continued support for this fundraising event, and we are grateful for the love and friendship it provides. We have decided that the 2026 golf tournament, our 18th, will be the last of this event, although the foundation’s work will continue.

FINANCES

In 2020 Wellesley Bank merged with Cambridge Trust, where we maintained our checking and savings accounts. In July 2024, Cambridge Trust merged with Eastern Bank, who now holds our accounts. Our balances at 12/31/2025 were \$12,182 (checking account) and \$10,851 (Certificate of Deposit). All of our bills are paid, and we have no accounts receivable. A Path in the Woods Fund, our donor-advised field of interest fund at The Community Foundation for MetroWest (FMW) had a balance at 12/31/2025 of \$85,547. The 2025 fund activity included \$300 in donor contributions and a gain in investment income of \$11,331, net of FMW management fees. We also made two grants from this fund totaling \$10,000. See below for specifics on those grants. A special thank you to our 2025 fund donors and to the FMW management team for their faithful stewardship of our funds. We also want to thank our advisors and tax return preparers at J Rizzo CPA LLC for their steady support and guidance since our incorporation 2009.

GRANTS & OTHER DISTRIBUTIONS

Our financial support for the Work-study Internship Program at Wellesley High School through our annual grants to the Wellesley Youth Commission was suspended in 2020 due to the limitations of school-work programs caused by the coronavirus and the related state & federal and local (Community Fund for Wellesley) financial support programs made available to the commission for student jobs. Between 2010 and 2019 we donated, through our grants, \$63,500 toward the work-study program for 60 plus student interns, who worked over 6,000 hours within various Town of Wellesley departments. We continue to stay in communication with the Youth Commission and should they decide to re-start the program, we will be available to provide financial support. We also continue to promote the idea of exposing students to the work of local government and its potential for career choices. Because we are a private foundation within the IRS 501(c)(3) designation, our direct support can be made to other 501(c)(3) non-profits only. Our financial support for the Work-study Internship Program was directed through our donor advised, field of interest fund, A Path in the Woods Fund, at the Community Foundation for MetroWest, a community foundation located in South Natick. We are very appreciative of the Foundation's support and guidance in managing our funds. Distributions from our Fund are made at our direction but are approved by the Foundation's board of directors as well. As we continue our work and follow through on our mission, we are now focusing our attention on providing grants directly to local non-profit organizations interested in hiring student interns who are seeking work experience after school and/or during the summer. We are looking for opportunities where students can gain hands-on experience in a supporting environment. One of our current partners in this program is the non-profit Wellesley Media Corporation, who have hired Wellesley High School students to work with their staff and learn TV & video production and media communications. Our contacts at Wellesley High School are the staff of the Bridge Program within the Counseling Department and the TV/Video Director in the Visual Arts Department. Our grant and our work with Wellesley Media Corporation are outlined below.

We are pleased to report that in 2025 we added two new work-study internship partners with local non-profits; The Wellesley Theatre Project and the Wellesley Historical Society. We are grateful for these new partners for their willingness to work with us and take on student interns from Wellesley High School. See below for more information about our new internships.

PATH FOUNDATION INTERNSHIP PARTNERS

Wellesley Media Corporation Student Internship

We began our work-study internship partnership with the Wellesley Media Corporation in 2018. They are a private non-profit organization that operates out of a studio and offices in rented spaces above Green's Hardware on Washington Street in Wellesley Hills. Wellesley Media is formerly known as Wellesley Community Access Cable Television. They broadcast Wellesley High School sporting events, Wellesley town government meetings, and Council on Aging speaker programs on local cable TV channels. They produce other programs of public interest as well as public

service announcements (PSA's). They also have a YouTube link on their website. They are funded in part by the license fee that local cable TV providers pay the Town of Wellesley. Their funding continues to be reduced based on changes in the FCC regulations controlling local CATV licensing agreements and the market trend away from conventional cable TV. We worked with Wellesley Media when we filmed a PSA for a program we called Thrive Wellesley over 10 years ago. In 2019, Wellesley Media produced three videos for us as a community public service. The first one helps us tell our story and talk about our mission. The second video is an interview with the people that oversee the Center for Psychiatric Rehabilitation at Boston University and the NITEO Program that we support (see below for more information). The third video is filmed at our 2019 annual golf tournament and barbeque lunch following the tournament. The Wellesley Theatre Project

The Wellesley Theatre Project's (WTP) studios and facilities are in the former Wellesley Community Center at 219 Washington Street. Their message is, "Empowering Youth & Cultivating Artists". They have become a force in our community, and beyond, for many families with artistic minded kids. Our internship is to work with their staff on stage-crafting, a behind the scenes learning experience. The mother of one of our WTP interns wrote to us recently, "he loves it so far and it's a great community for him to be part of". Wellesley Historical Society

The Wellesley Historical Society (WHS) acquired the property at 323 Washington Street and converted the former single-family home into the Wellesley History & Exhibit Center. With the support of community members, they did a really nice job with the renovation. The exhibit space is beautiful. Researchers and students can access resources on-site, making the Center a place for both learning and discovery. We reached out to the Executive Director Faith Ellis, who with her Board of Directors agreed to take on one of our WHS interns. Our partnership developed with Faith will continue with the new director Audrey Donahue. Our intern will assist the WHS staff with preparing exhibits at the new History Center. Our Partnership with Wellesley High School

With the support of the Wellesley High School administration, our internships at Wellesley Media Corp, the Wellesley Theatre Project & the Wellesley Historical Society are usually coordinated by the staff at the Wellesley High School's Bridge Program. The Bridge Program works with Wellesley High students who are returning from a hospital and/or treatment center due to emotional or medical reasons. The Bridge Program helps students and their families with reentry and reintegration into school by supporting their academic, social and emotional needs. Typically, students are referred to Bridge by their Guidance Counselor or Assistant Principal upon hearing about the student's absence. The Wellesley High School Bridge Program is one of many similar "bryt" programs across Massachusetts designed to support students and families. BRYT (pronounced "bright") bridges the disciplines of education, mental health, and youth development to transform the way schools support students. The bryt program has worked to destigmatize mental health across communities so that school is a safe and inclusive environment to learn and thrive.

Providing a Scholarship to the NITEO Program at Boston University's Sargent College

We also have a partnership with the NITEO Program at the Center for Psychiatric Rehabilitation (CPR) at Boston University's Sargent College. Their relatively small facility is located at 940 Commonwealth Ave. West on the Brookline/Boston line.

NITEO is an intensive; one-semester program supporting young adults who live with a mental health condition develop wellness tools, academic skills, resilience, and work-readiness. NITEO was established in 2014, and hundreds of students have graduated from the program and moved on to valued roles in their communities.

The NITEO curriculum provides students with opportunities to:

- Practice and develop resiliency skills to help them live well at school and work,
- Examine their educational, vocational, and social strengths and values, and,
- Develop an individualized path to choose, get and keep the valued roles of their choice.

All classes are held at the Center for Psychiatric Rehabilitation at Boston University; Sargent College, and enrolled students (not exclusively from BU) have access to various other University resources including the Fitness and Recreation Center. See their website for more information. <https://cpr.bu.edu/about/> Each fall (September-December) and spring (January-May) semester, 15-19 students are invited to participate in NITEO. The semester-long program is a simulation of the college experience where students have opportunities to: attend wellness and academic classes to build skills for work, and personal success; build lasting relationships with same-age peers and support staff; work one-on-one with an assigned College Coach for individualized support around a host of academic, vocational, social, and wellness areas. Students need not be from BU. NITEO operates under the umbrella of the Trustees of Boston University as a 501(c)(3) so we can provide a scholarship/grant directly to the Center under IRS rules. In 2025 we provided a grant to the

Center for Psychiatric Rehabilitation at Boston University to support a NITEO student and to continue to develop their programming more directly with families through their Flourishing Families Program and help them learn what's needed to support their teens who are struggling with mental health challenges. Since our partnership with the Center began in 2018, we have donated \$39,500 to the NITEO and Flourishing Families programs.

The Resilience Project at Newton Wellesley Hospital.

A Community Health Initiative from the Division of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at Newton-Wellesley Hospital (NWH).

A Path in the Woods Foundation has partnered with the Kiwanis Club of Wellesley, the Wellesley Youth Commission, the Wellesley Health Department, with a grant from the Community Fund for Wellesley, to produce a series of workshops for families in Wellesley interested in



learning about teen and family mental health and wellness. The name of our initiative is **Thrive Wellesley** and the NWH workshop series is titled, **Building Resilience: Supporting Youth Mental Health**. The programming is provided by The Resilience Project at NWH. The Resilience Project is an innovative school and community-based program that promotes the emotional health and well-being of children, teens and those who support them. Their team of mental health specialists' partners with parents, caregivers, and schools in the greater Newton-Wellesley Hospital community. We are excited to be part of this initiative. Two workshops were held in 2024 at the Wellesley Free Library Wakelin Room. A third Thrive Wellesley session was held in January 2025. We also worked with the Wellesley Kiwanis Club & the Youth Commission to host mental health advocate & author, Dayna Altman, for a workshop that she calls Bake It Till You Make It, also at the Wellesley Free Library, held in November.



A Path in the Woods Foundation also continues to sponsor an annual Day of Giving, American Red Cross Blood drive on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving in memory of Dan McCabe, who as a 17-year-old donated blood three times and encourage his friends to donate. The drive is hosted by the Wellesley Hills Congregational Church.

OUR MISSION AND OUR HISTORY

A Path in The Woods Foundation, Inc. is a non-profit, charitable organization that was created in 2009 in memory of Daniel McCabe of Wellesley, MA. The foundation is dedicated to opening new doors of opportunity and exploration for the young men and women in our community and beyond who are searching for their path in life and need assistance, financial or otherwise in beginning their journey. The foundation raises funds through community-based events and through direct contributions. The funds are used to provide grants for young adults for training and education related to developing job skills and building self-confidence.

The foundation is organized exclusively for charitable and educational purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or corresponding section of any future federal tax code.

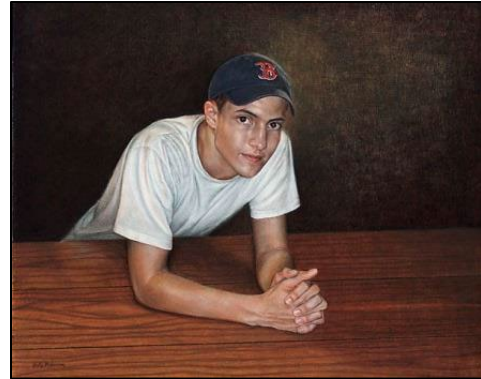
